Years ago, I went to a Maia Danziger workshop at Omega Institute in Rhinebeck, NY, called *Relax and Write*. After a relaxing, guided meditation, Maia asked us to pick up a blank sheet of paper and just write whatever came into our minds and hands. This was the stream of consciousness result - poor punctuation, spelling and all:

My mother wore bathing suits all summer long---ones with little skirts. She never wore shoes at the cottage and was proud of her *dirty feet. She cleaned the cottage by sweeping* from front to back and out the back door---dirt and sand, shale & small bits of cotton from the cottonwood trees. Everything went out as she added more dirt to her beautiful feet. Mother loved me---she loved everyone. She was always there for everyone asking no recompense, nothing in return. She died early in life, in 1980 at age 61---too many cigarettes and too many martini's [sic]. I once was asked as part of a spiritual intuitive energy class to put my hand on my head and ask a question. The next step was to put my hand on my heart and ask the same question. My question was to my mother, who had been dead for close to 20 years. I asked, "What did you want from me?" My head said what an easy question and told me that my mother wanted me to love her more. I felt good about such a succinct [sic] answer. My heart said, "I wanted you to love yourself more." I cried the tears I never shed at her funeral.



On another sheet of paper, I wrote: Another mother story: she loved shoes and had a plastic shoe container on the back of her closet door. All her shoes were open toe, sling backs. She called them her "chippy shoes." She loved to be with her shoes and enjoy the diversity of color amongst the single design... My mother, so long gone and so much a part of me.

My mother will have been gone 44 years on September 30th. I recently found the above writing exercise when cleaning out a desk drawer. I was going to throw it out until I decided to share it. Sometimes just relaxing and letting the unconscious bleed into the conscious on a piece of blank paper is a head and heart opening experience. I dare you to try it.

Dear Richmond Cemetery Committee,

May 29, 2024

First and foremost you have my deepest sympathies for all the "behind the scenes" work that you do without any fanfare and limited funds. People see the end results of your efforts but few know or understand what an effort it takes to preserve, stabilize, and maintain a cemetery, let alone the number that you are charged with.

I am also involved in cemetery work, as that I head up a crew of seven volunteer workers for the Barclay Cemetery here in Bradford County, Pa. We face some of the same challenges as you do including the fact that trees are not a cemetery's best friend and something you don't have to deal with, mine subsidence.

Some of you may be asking yourselves why I am interested in your cemeteries and not just the one (or others) where I live. That answer can be attributed to my journey starting in 1985 with researching my family's past, which lead me to Richmond, NH. and the Quaker Cemetery. For you see, all the Martins buried there are my direct ancestors. Martins buried in your other cemeteries are shirttail relatives. In some ways visiting Richmond is like coming back home.

I have read some of your past minutes posted on the town's website for issues dealing with broken equipment, grave sites that need attention, and tree removal. I might be able to enlighten you on solutions we have instituted over the past 18 years at the Barclay Cemetery for stabilizing and preserving grave sites, general maintenance and cemetery security.

I have tentative plans to be in Ashburnham, Ma. for a few days in mid to late July. I could come up and visit with anyone of you if you wish. In the meantime my donation of \$1,000 can be used in any way you see fit to fund your work at Richmond cemeteries.

Contact Information

The Town Clerk's office is asking all property owners to give us their most current contact information, so we can update our records. We are finding that, with the number of new residents, plus people changing phones and emails, we are scrambling to issue dog licenses, dump stickers, etc., and, if we need to call you, we **absolutely need the most recent contact information**. Your contact information is protected and is not shared. Having current phone numbers and emails means we can serve you better and more efficiently. <u>Dogs</u>

Also, **please contact the office if you no longer have a dog**. The only one who can advise of that is you. So, please take the time to let us know. All NH vets are required to

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supply the Town Clerk with rabies vaccinations, so we know whether or not you have a dog. Licenses were due April 30th; there are now late fees associated with the licensing. If you have a dog, please take that responsibility seriously and be sure your pet is vaccinated for rabies and licensed. That is the law and it's up to you. <u>Postal Delays</u>

The Post Office is no longer allowing me to hand over the mail that is for Richmond only. It used to be the postal workers would turn the mail around in the Post Office, instead of it going to a distribution center. However, I have been informed that **all mail now has to go to a main processing or distribution center (wherever that may be!), so mail may be delayed.** It is imperative that you allow a couple of weeks before your expiration date so you receive your registrations from us in a timely fashion. We do try to process registrations as soon as we get them; so, if you don't get them in a week or two, let us know. Mail sometimes doesn't get to where it needs to be.

Grand Canyon Here We Come! Renee Murphy

Did you know you could hop on the New England Trail in Richmond and hike to Connecticut? The New England Trail (NET) is a 215-mile trail that includes most of the three single trails: Metacomet-Monadnock Trail, Mattabesett Trail, and Metacomet Trail. It goes from Long Island Sound, CT, up to Royalston Falls, at the Massachusettes/New Hampshire border.





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
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After stabilizing a health issue that has plagued me for the last four years, Kevin and I have been working this year to get back into hiking and trail running. Walking the dogs every morning has started a slow journey in building my stamina back up to going some distance and miles. We wanted to challenge ourselves once we had my confidence back, so I entered the Grand Canyon lottery for campsites.

The National Park Service holds a lottery through Recreation.gov where 750

people are picked to be able to reserve campsites at the bottom of the canyon five months in advance. If you win the first lottery, the Service chooses when you can make a reservation. The Service designates 50 people a day for fifteen days to be able to make your campsite reservations. Fortunately, we were selected for the third day, so we had the pick of our dates and campsites for the most part. At the end of September, we are going for four days, from the South Rim South Kaibab trail, over to the Tonto Trail to Havasupai Campground, and then to Cottonwood Campground, with a stop at Ribbon Falls. We wake up on the third day, go up to the North Kaibab Trail to the North Rim, back down Bright Angel Campground with a dinner at Phantom Ranch,






and then wake up and climb up the South Rim. The trek is around 50 miles with 12,000 feet of elevation gain.

We have a few months to prepare our bodies and gear for this adventure. We are working to make our pack as light as possible; for example, we will use Military Woobie blankets instead of sleeping bags to save 2.5 pounds. It gets sweltering as you descend into the Grand Canyon, and water is essential for a healthy hike. Kevin and I only drink a little water when hiking here, so we are training ourselves to take in enough water during our hikes. We will also use a sawyer squeeze filter system for the water from the river. The food you eat while doing a big hike needs to get you enough calories and still feel good, so Kevin has started testing the recipe for our homemade Bobo bars! Of course, the biggest challenge is continuing to train to be ready.





We have started regularly hiking up Mt Monadnock with our packs loaded and hiking poles, and we are also knocking off some of the 48 4,000 feet mountains in the Whites. We are doing two big hikes called the Presidential Traverse (23 miles long with close to 9,000 feet of elevation gain) and the Pemigewasset ("Pemi") Loop (31.2 miles with around 9,724 feet elevation gain). The surprise is that we can jump on the NET trail about three miles from our home from Parker Road, an old Class 6 logging road. We can go left on the NET about five miles to Royalston Falls or make a right and go over Mayo Hill and beyond. Our goal is to make it to Mount Grace in Warwick, MA. It would be quite the adventure to see how far we can go towards Connecticut, but that might be later in the fall after the Grand Canyon.

Now you know if you see Kevin and I loaded up and walking with our packs and poles, we are not running away from home, but it's just the Murphy's On-Trail Training for our summer hiking and adventure in the Grand Canyon.









Organic farm forever conserved in Winchester!
