# An Exciting Find Jane Lescynski, Cemetery Trustee



At the July 8th Selectmen's Meeting, Sexton Bob Gow proudly showed the Selectmen his discovery: a 154 year old coffin plate which had worked its way up through the soil and got caught up in his rake. The inscription on the coffin plate reads:

Benjamin Bolles Died Jan 31 1870 Aged 58 Years

Details found on Ancestry.com show Mr. Bolles was a farmer and passed away from Typhoid Fever.

# **The Ol' Town Pound**Lenny Solomon and Wendy O'Brien,

Richmond Historical Society



How many Richmond residents even know we have a Town Pound? We do, and it's located diagonally across Route 32 from the Veterans' Hall. What - you can't see it? That's probably because it hasn't been used since 1886.

Back in the day, i.e., 1774, the Town records indicate that Ebenezer Cole was elected to the post of Pound Keeper. The position of Pound Keeper was a very important one, as it was responsible for putting stray livestock, such as pigs, cattle and sheep, in a holding pen until the owner could be identified.

Working with another elected official called the "Hog Reave" who rounded up stray pigs, the Pound Keeper would capture stray animals and return them to their rightful owners. The first Town Pound was probably made of timber, because, at an 1801 town meeting, the voters decided to build a new pound out of stone. At several subsequent meetings, various citizens asked the Town to reconsider some details of the proposal. In 1802, a 40' x 40' structure was built on land owned by Joseph Weeks, who was appointed Pound Keeper. Weeks, who held this position until 1823, was also a judge and a New Hampshire state politician.

The structure boasted seven-foot walls above grade with an additional foot dug one foot below. There "...the Founding Fathers gave the free press the protection it must have to fulfill its essential role in our democracy.

The press was to serve the governed, not the governors."

was a wooden gate to keep the animals confined. The pound had some restoration work performed in 1842 and was used continuously until 1886. Since the need to deal with stray livestock today is rare, the function has evolved into the modern animal control officer.

Through the hard work of the members of the Richmond Historical Society, the Pound is now open to visitors! We have several people to thank: Bill and Eena Cantrell for allowing access to the Pound; Bonnie McCarthy for coordinating the signage; Bill Daniels for donating gravel for the pathway; and Al Bielunis, Dick Drew, Jerry Mills, and Jerry Merrifield for installing the new signs, handrail, and grading the gravel path. We hope you are interested in visiting this historic site. Please park in the Veterans' Hall parking lot and carefully cross the road. Please also stay within the confines of the Pound, as it is surrounded by private property.

### **Apple Brownies** Terri O'Rorke

Ingredients

1 C. sugar

½ C. butter, melted

1 large egg

3 medium apples - peeled, cored and thinly sliced

½ C. chopped walnuts

1 C. all-purpose flour

½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. each baking powder and baking soda

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

#### Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 9" x 9" baking dish. Beat sugar, melted butter, and egg in a large bowl with an electric mixer until fluffy. Fold in the apples and walnuts. Sift flour, salt, baking powder, baking soda, and cinnamon together in a separate bowl; stir into apple mixture until just blended. Spread batter evenly in the prepared baking dish. Bake for about 35 minutes until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 12.



### A Visit with Abraham Lincoln: a Living History Event Wendy O'Brien, Secretary Richmond Historical Society

The Richmond Historical Society will host "A Visit with Abraham Lincoln," a living history presentation by Steve Wood, at 6:30 PM, Wednesday, September 25th, at the Veterans' Hall. The program, free and open to the public, is funded in part by a grant from New Hampshire Humanities.



"President Lincoln" will tell the story of his visit to New Hampshire in 1860, after his Cooper Union Address in New York City, and his subsequent nomination and election to the Presidency. After the program, Wood will step out of character and take questions from the audience. Wood, from Claremont, has been speaking as Abraham Lincoln for historical societies, libraries, schools, and community events throughout New England since 1995. He is retired, having worked for nearly thirty years with UNH Cooperative Extension as an Extension Educator in Forest Resources.



The Richmond Mobile Food Pantry Event took place on Saturday, July 27th, at the Vets' Hall. I would like to thank all the volunteers and everyone who came and took home food. About 80 households received fresh corn, summer squash, tomatoes, Swiss chard, carrots, cucumbers, potatoes, and onions. In addition, there was bread, farm- fresh beef and chicken, plus the ingredients for a spaghetti dinner. A special kids' favorite table contained items like applesauce and mac-and-cheese. The Monadnock Humane Society supplied dog and cat food, collars, and leashes.

These events are for Cheshire County residents. All the food is free of charge, and there is no income eligibility requirement. Just come to one of the Mobile Food Pantry Events, bring a photo ID and register to be eligible to obtain food at all the mobile food pantries in the four local towns (Fitzwilliam, Gilsum, Richmond, Winchester). 


